



On behalf of the Board of Directors, Delegate Assembly, and Executive Director, I welcome you as you join us during the 2022 NYSABE 44th Annual Conference. Our conference theme: *RECLAIMING SOCIAL JUSTICE IN BILINGUAL EDUCATION for MULTILINGUAL LEARNERS: The Time is Now!*, inspires us to reflect upon the work that remains to be done in our school communities, while seeing the urgency of taking action to address the social, emotional, educational and linguistic inequities that continue to impact our communities adversely.

As your NYSABE president for 2021-2022, I recognize that we all, as members of the NYSABE family, have faced difficult times of uncertainty and perhaps the feeling that these difficulties will continue with no end in sight. With so many issues left unresolved, under my presidency I have tried to maintain a level of optimism and resiliency as we continue to serve our fragile communities which too often are underserved for required services and resources. Providing the necessary supports is critical for our multilingual learners to thrive. Thus, you might be thinking, how do we begin to gain a sense of normalcy as we continue to work with our communities?

The process towards normalcy requires time and patience as we think of new methods to allow flexibility for multilingual learners to flourish in classrooms, such as: A) rethinking curriculum that can be taught not curriculum that is expected; B) supporting online coaching or tutoring to assist students with the content they missed while continuing in school learning; C) identifying times throughout the year when additional language learning is possible via other means besides the classroom; D) reviewing current curriculum to adapt and allow for extended learning opportunities. Besides the educational, you have the social and emotional pieces which must be considered simultaneously - what has been called, the "affective domain." That's why you are attending our conference this year, to hear keynote speakers and presenters share their ideas and practices.

NYSABE, as your professional organization, continues to advocate for the needs of students and families, as a primary mission. Our NYSABE Advocacy Committee continues to meet with state and local decision makers to assure that our student needs are prioritized in funding sources while allowing creative methods. At the local level, bilingual educators should actively provide feedback on how funds can be used to offer opportunities that can accelerate and increase language instruction in all languages. Educational policy continues to be on our radar and we hope that as educators of multilingual learners, you join us during our policy session during this year's conference and beyond. We need your proactive participation so that we can identify programs and ensure successful practices.

Lastly, NYSABE publishes a journal with articles from researchers, specialists and educators in the field on the most up-to-date research-based practices that can be replicated in classrooms throughout New York State and beyond. The latest issue of the *Journal of Multilingual Education Research (JMER)*, is on our website and I recommend its use for districts and schools seeking to adjust educational practices that may address some literacy or language gaps created by the pandemic.

As I sign off, I want to thank NYSABE members who continue year after year to seek new developments and gain knowledge to support our multilingual communities.

The time is when? Now! It is time to refresh, reflect and pursue what is equitable for our students.







Celebration of a Pioneer: A Tribute to Carmen C. Dinos

Carmen Dinos was living in Greece when the Director of the Migration Division of the Commonwealth of P.R. in New York offered her the position of Supervisor of their Education Program. He had been looking for a qualified individual who could work with New York City's Board of Education (presently known as the Department of Education). Carmen's qualifications included post graduate linguistic/education degrees and extensive experience in Puerto Rico teaching at all levels from first grade to High School in rural and urban schools, as well as at the University of Puerto Rico. She also worked as a researcher at Puerto Rico's Board of Higher Education (Consejo Superior de Enseñanza).

As a spokesperson for the Governor of Puerto Rico, Carmen advocated for quality programs for Puerto Rican students; she reached out to young professionals, community leaders, legislators, and parents in order to build support and understanding for these programs. After many months of negotiations, the NYC Board of Education consented to start recruiting teachers to implement a curriculum for the new bilingual education programs. Carmen was named the head of the Recruitment and Training Program for Spanish Speaking Teachers at the NYC Board of Education.

When the Puerto Rican Studies Department was established at Brooklyn College, Professor Dinos was invited to assist in developing the linguistic and cultural curriculum for the department. Shortly after, the School of Education at Brooklyn College recruited her to work in conjunction with the Dean and the State of New York to develop the first registered training program for bilingual elementary teachers. Brooklyn College's Bilingual Program was the first NYSED-approved certified program for Bilingual Elementary School teachers. It served as a model for many institutions of higher education in the State of New York.

You are an exemplary teacher, visionary, pioneer, and teacher educator whose tireless and dedicated work has inspired so many. Your students, student teachers, colleagues, as well as researchers and leaders in education and the community, have championed the rights of multilingual students to succeed academically through high quality Bilingual Education pedagogy thanks to your advocacy, guidance, and the example you have set throughout your life.

NYSABE 2022 KEYNOTE/MAJOR SPEAKERS' BIOGRAPHIES

Uju Anya, Associate Professor of Second Language Acquisition Carnegie Mellon University

Dr. Uju Anya is associate professor of second language acquisition at Carnegie Mellon University. She specializes in applied linguistics, sociolinguistics, critical discourse studies, and language education with particular focus on race, gender, sexual, and social class identities in the language classroom. Her other research interests include applied linguistics as a practice of social justice, intercultural communication, translanguaging pedagogies, and Blackness in multilingualism

Nelson Flores, Associate Professor Educational Linguistics Division University of Pennsylvania Graduate School of Education

Nelson Flores is an associate professor in educational linguistics at the University of Pennsylvania Graduate School of Education. His research examines how language and race intersect in bilingual education policies and practices in ways that are harmful to racialized bilingual students. He is the recipient of many awards including the 2017 AERA Bilingual Education SIG Early Career Award, a 2017 Spencer Postdoctoral Fellowship and the 2019 James Alatis Prize for Research on Language Planning and Policy in Educational Contexts.

Trish Morita-Mullaney, Associate Professor Bilingual Education Purdue University

Trish Morita-Mullaney is an Associate Professor Bilingual Education at Purdue University. Trish is a teacher, coach, building and district administrator with experiences in California, Arizona and Indiana. Trish has been instrumental in changing the Indiana language policy landscape for emergent bilinguals, leading to more robust licensure and training requirements for teachers of emergent bilinguals. Her research focuses on the intersection between language learning, gender and race and how this informs the identity acts of educators of bilingual students. Guided by critical and feminist thought, she examines how these overlapping identities inform and shape bilingual education leadership.

Sonia Soltero, Professor and Department Chair, DePaul University

Sonia Soltero is Professor and Chair of the Department of Leadership, Language, and Curriculum, and former Director of the Bilingual-Bicultural Education Graduate Program at DePaul University in Chicago. She is a former bilingual and dual language teacher and program coordinator. Soltero has numerous publications on English Learners, dual language, bilingual education and Latino education, including three books: Dual Language Education: Program Design and Implementation, School-Wide Approaches to Educating English Language Learners, and Dual Language: Teaching and Learning in Two Languages. She has been involved with dual and bilingual education for more than thirty years as a dual language teacher, university professor, professional developer, and researcher.

Juliana Urtubey, National Teacher of the Year

Juliana Urtubey, a first-generation, bilingual immigrant, has worked throughout her teaching career to serve as a mirror for her school community, helping students to be proud of their identities and families, and to acknowledge their strengths and contributions to the community.

As 2021 National Teacher of the Year, Juliana advocates for a "joyous and just" education for all students, one that is inclusive and celebratory of all students' identities, families and communities. Since being announced as National Teacher of the Year in May 2021, Juliana has shared her "joyous and just" message with pre-service teachers, educators and policymakers across the country – including at the White House – and through U.S. and international media, including People Magazine, the TODAY Show, Univision, Telemundo, and Colombia's El Pais, El Espectador, and RCN Noticias.

Juliana, currently in her 11th year as an educator, teaches at Kermit R. Booker, Sr. Innovative Elementary School in Las Vegas, where she serves as a co-teacher in pre-kindergarten through fifthgrade special education settings and as an instructional strategist developing supports to meet students' differing academic, social-emotional and behavioral needs.

Known as "Ms. Earth" for her efforts to beautify schools and unify the community through murals and gardens, Juliana has helped raise funds for garden programs at two Las Vegas schools. In one program, the garden was tended to by the student "Garden Gnomies" club and offered opportunities for innovative student learning and intergenerational learning and connections to the wider community, who could purchase produce on an as-able donation basis or with volunteer hours.

Juliana is a National Board Certified Teacher and holds a bachelor's degree in bilingual elementary education and a master's degree in special bilingual education from the University of Arizona. She is a National Board for Professional Teaching Standards Board of Directors member and Teacher Fellow, a Nevada Teach Plus Senior Policy Fellow, and an Understood Teacher Fellow and mentor. She is also a winner of the 2018 Rogers Foundation Heart of Education award.

Juliana (HOO-lee-on-a ER-two-bay) enjoys reading in Spanish and traveling, and has had the opportunity to teach in Ecuador, Mexico, Spain and Puerto Rico. She also enjoys tending to her collection of house plants and spending time outdoors, and she aims to visit all the National Parks.

Bilingual Teacher of the Year Award

Ms. Alexandra Hernandez is a dynamic and accomplished bilingual special education teacher at PS 257 in Brooklyn with 25 years of experience. She was born in Santiago de Los Caballeros in the Dominican Republic. She graduated High School from el Colegio Sagrado Corazon de Jesus and attended La Universidad Católica Madre y Maestra, in Santiago, Dominican Republic where she was pursuing a degree in medicine. She came to New York in 1988 and began her service as a NYCDOE paraprofessional in 1993 and has been a bilingual special education teacher at PS 257 in Brooklyn, NY since 1997. She continued her studies and earned B.A. from Boricua College, a Dual Master's Degree from Long Island University in Special Education and Bilingual Education. She also attained an Advanced Education Degree in School Leadership from the College of Saint Rose. MS. Hernandez is a valuable member of her school Instructional Leadership Framework, School Leadership Team and continues her advocacy work for students with disabilities.

Nicole Baron Rosefort

Gladys Correa Memorial Award

Nicole Baron Rosefort is a Resource Specialist with the New York State Statewide Language Regional Bilingual Education Resource Network (NYS Language RBERN) at New York University. Ms. Rosefort began her NYCDOE teaching career during the late 1960s, years of constant struggle for civil rights and Bilingual Education. Born in Haiti, she attended Holy Name School in NYC, graduated from Cathedral HS, and received her BA and MA from Hunter College, and a Professional Diploma from LIU. Throughout her career, Ms. Rosefort has served as District Trilingual Coordinator, Assistant Principal, Principal, Assistant to the Superintendent, and Director of Literacy. For seven years, Ms. Rosefort served as the Director of the NYS Haitian Bilingual Education Technical Assistance Center at Brooklyn College (HABETAC), supporting English Language Learners (ELLs), before joining the NYS Statewide Language RBERN at NYU.

Andrea Lucio Mieles

Bilingual Parent of the Year Award

Andrea Lucio Mieles is a cultural researcher. Her research focuses on health, education (knowledge) and the impact of generational ancestral trauma in contemporaneity. In 2017 she started a project called Carishina. Carishina provides cultural education through travel, exposure to human interaction. Andrea was born and raised in Ecuador. She has lived in New York State since 2008. In 2015, she hyphenated her identity to ecuadorian-american. She believes there are New Yorkers around the world, they just have to find their way back home. 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
